- You believe in redemption and transformative grace



How many people are homeless in Cambridge?

- Cambridge City population was 145,700 in 2021 census.
- South Cambridgeshire was 162,100.
- We have around 25.6 people per football pitch-sized piece of land. In the top 20% most densely populated English local authority areas.
 South Cambridgeshire has 1.3 people.
- 31.4% of households in privately-rented homes. This was 26.2% in 2011.

How many people are homeless in Cambridge?

- 2262 people sought city council advice related to "housing stress" April 2022 – March 2023.
- 841 homelessness applications where the applicant was initially assessed as being owed a statutory duty April 2022 March 2023.
- Approximately 270 people living in hostels and supported accommodation in Cambridge.
- 23 recorded rough sleepers in the city of Cambridge in Nov 2022.

Loss of last settled home

- Loss of privately rented accommodation
- Family and friends no longer able to accommodate
- Relationship breakdown
- Lack of affordable housing or not being able to access private rental
- Benefit sanctions
- Leaving institutions

Wintercomfort

- Offers showers, laundry, clothing, breakfast, housing advice, mental health support, wellbeing, training and learning.
- Drop-in 8:30-2pm (12 noon weekends)
- Supports 800 individuals each year.
- 22,000 visits to the centre. Average daily attendance of 65 people.

Cambridge Cyrenians

- Oldest homelessness service in the city (started in 1970)
- Supported accommodation in small shared houses.
- 100 bed-spaces in 21 houses dispersed around Cambridge.
- Mix of short-stay, move-on, and long-stay shared houses.
- Project Workers work with residents to develop skills for independent living – helps them to engage with other services, apply for benefits, pay rent.
- 45 people supported by the Older Homeless Service.

Jimmy's Cambridge

- 1995 first all year round night shelter.
- 20 bedrooms in the main East Road hostel.
- 9 bedrooms in 451 hostel
- 30 bedrooms in 10 shared houses across Cambridge.
- 22 single-occupancy modular homes

Riverside: The Victoria Project / 222 Victoria Road / The Twos / TVP / and The Springs

- National social housing provider.
- TVP has 34 rooms for people with high-needs.
- The Springs has self-contained flats for people with low support needs.
- Willow Walk now closed.

Cambridge Churches Homeless Project

- Started in November 2017
- Winter shelter project with 15 beds in 11 churches and the Beth Shalom Synagogue.
- Now supports It Takes a City to run the Crossways Winter Provision
- Also facilitates and funds accommodation for people with No Recourse to Public Funds (NRPF).
- Registration for volunteers will open again in the autumn

The Haven Pilot

It Takes a City's Women's Homelessness Action Group is looking for a space to pilot the 'Haven', an overnight drop-in space for homeless and vulnerable women. In order to run the project, we are looking into options for spaces that we can use for a trial phase. We have received funding to pilot the project from Spring 2024 for up to a year, although we would consider shorter periods.

Essential Requirements:

- Within 1 mile of the city centre, for easy accessibility on foot / by public transport
- Available in the evening and overnight, although timings can be flexible during trial phase
- Available for at least two nights per week
- A separate entrance which can be securely staffed (bell and lockable door)
- A space that can be made welcoming with sofas, cushions and tables
- Small storage space for the WHAG to keep items needed for the Haven
- Toilets including accessible toilet
- Facilities to make hot drinks and heat up food or space for a kettle and microwave

The Haven Pilot

Desirable:

- An inviting building with a warm vibe that can be made to feel un-institutional
- A shower / washing facilities
- A washing machine and dryer (or space for installation)
- A kitchen
- An additional room for private meetings and / or consultation
- Access to wifi and a computer

The Haven is not:

- A night shelter with beds
- An assessment space for homeless women
- A drug and alcohol treatment service
