Some book suggestions:

David Koyzis, Political Visions and Illusions.

Koyzis looks at five key political ideologies and explores them through a helpful Christian framework – not a 'light' read but worth it. Or find him on podcasts/Youtube etc.

• Nick Spencer and Jonathan Chaplin, God and Government.

Addressing the question: What, according to Christian thought, is the proper function of government? Equipping you to think more deeply about this with lots of excellent contributors.

• James Mumford, Vexed.

A good look at a number of key ethical political issues 'beyond political tribes' – trying to cut across the political divide. Christian perspective but not made explicit, relying on arguments that would make sense to a secular audience too; very readable.

Christian Principles for Politics - activity

- Thinking about the Christian story of Creation, what principles and beliefs will shape a Christian approach to politics?
- Thinking about other stories, proverbs and prophetic texts in the Old Testament, are there any lessons we can draw for political engagement?
- Thinking about Jesus, his teachings, life and death, what did he teach and show us in relation to politics, power and authorities?
- Thinking about the church, letters to the church, and God's kingdom (now and when Jesus returns), are there any other principles we can bring to bear on politics?
